Impact of SPG spending April 2021 - April 2022

- 1. Improved provision thus leading to better break and lunchtime behavior at the school. Every effort is made to maximize the space and facilities at the school given its residential and town location with no green space or opportunities to expand. ©
- 3. Greater provision to support children and staff in celebrating, promoting and delivering high quality sports and physical activity. Data within the school shows that during the 2021-22 year 90% of the children at GJS represented either their house or the school in tournaments, competitions and festivals. This is a fantastic achievement and hope to repeat these numbers for the coming year. Further analysis in the future will show whether there is a discrepancy between year groups and gender. ©
- 4. Year 5 once again were trained and under the guidance of the Year 5 teaching team, delivered support, officiating and scoring roles to children throughout the school at lunchtimes for those who may find the dynamics of break and lunch times difficult a calmer and more structured place to play. This therefore led to less playground incident and improved behavior. ©
- 5. Various sports events not only were attended by the PE assistant but also by teachers and where possible, SLT. This further promoted and raised the profile of intra and inter school sports thus leading to better sporting behaviours at events and greater levels of participation. ©
- 6. As above. A number of children who represented the school and those who supervised attended the events run by our feeder secondary schools such as hockey, multi sports, rounders and indoor athletics. ©
- 8. New equipment was purchased to enhance and grow the circuit training stations such as sparring pads and gloves, playtime equipment such as balls, skipping ropes and ankle skips were provided and for curriculum equipment such as tennis balls, hurdles, kwick cricket balls, rounders balls and bibs. ©
- 9. House t-shirts purchased for the new Year 3 children with also the help of the PTA. School also researching more appropriately and cost effective ways to source PE shirts. ©
- 10. Annual maintenance check of sports equipment, benches and trim trail carried out.

- 11. To further raise the profile of events and participation from the children, medals and awards purchased and handed out. These included medals for cross country runners, winning footballers, cricketers, netballers and basketballers across the school. ©
